WOMAN DECAPITATED.

IS IT JACK THE RIPPER?

About half-past seven o'clock last night a woman was murdered at South Hampstead. The corpse was discovered under a wall near the junction of Adamson Road at Eton Avenue, and the head was almost severed from the body, and was immersed in a pool of blood. The deceased was well dressed. She was known to the police as an unfortunate who frequently walked up and down Eton Avenue. The police are prosecuting urgent inquiries, but so far they have not come upon the author of the crime.

A later telegram gives information of the murder at South Hampstead was promptly sent to Scotland Yard. Inspector Swanson and several detectives who had been engaged from time to time in the Whitechapel inquiries started for Hampstead and took charge of the case. They soon found that about the time of the murder a respectably dressed man hailed a cab at the end of Eton Avenue, and

HAS JACK THE RIPPER RETURNED?

STARTLING STORY FROM WHITECHAPEL.

AN ATTEMPTED MURDER AND NARROW ESCAPE.

The *Morning* to-day contains a startling story of the attempted murder and hairbreadth escape of a young woman in a dark lane in Whitechapel, under circumstances strikingly analogous to those in which several of the Whitechapel atrocities of two and three years ago were perpetrated. 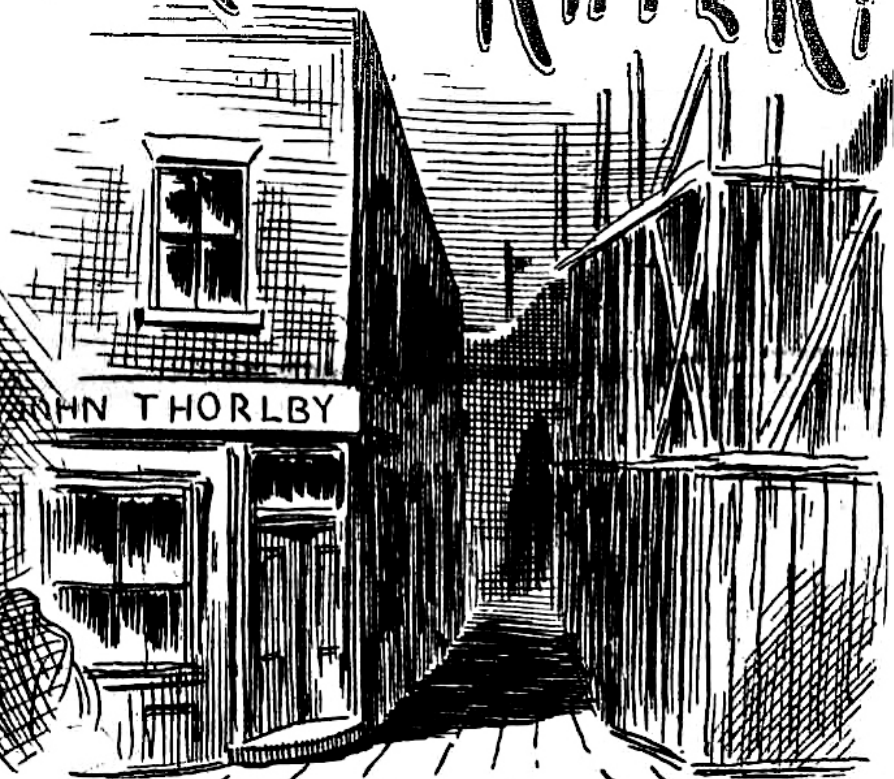

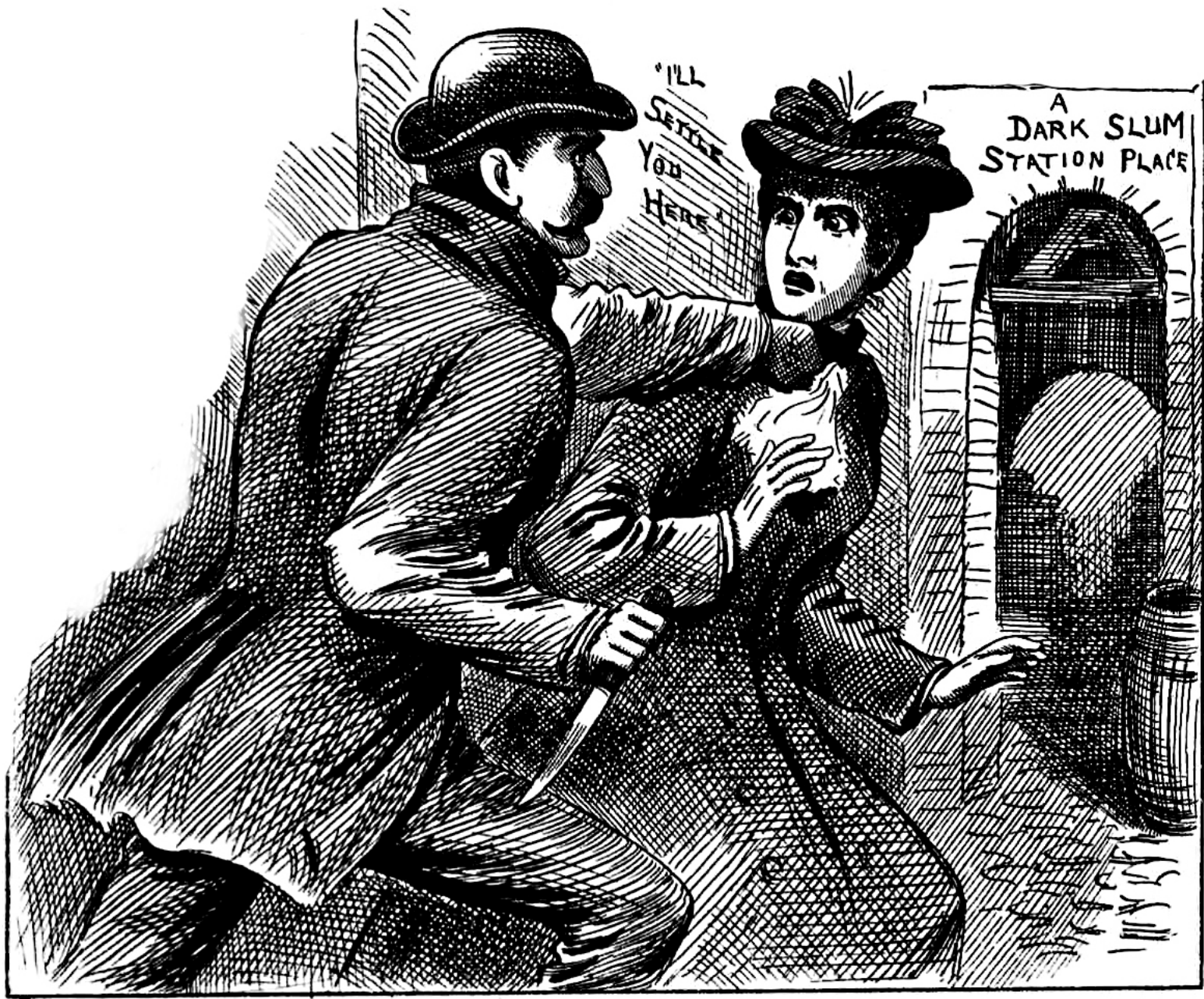

A "JACK THE RIPPER" MURDER IN KENSINGTON.

Shortly before one o'clock on Monday morning the body of a woman was found by a passer-by lying on the pavement in a quiet portion of Holland-park-road, Kensington. A constable was summoned, and on examination it was found that the woman's throat had been cut, and that life was extinct. The constable raised an alarm, and assistance was quickly at hand. The body was carried to the police-station, about a quarter of a mile distance, where it was seen by Dr. Townsend, the divisional surgeon, who, finding his services were useless ordered its removal to the Kensington mortuary to await an inquest. Close to the body, which was near the kerbstone was found a walking stick of cherry wood with a hooked handle. Late in the afternoon the body was identified as that of Augusta Dudley, living at 36, St. Clement's-road, Notting-dale. She left home at eight o'clock on Sunday night, announcing her

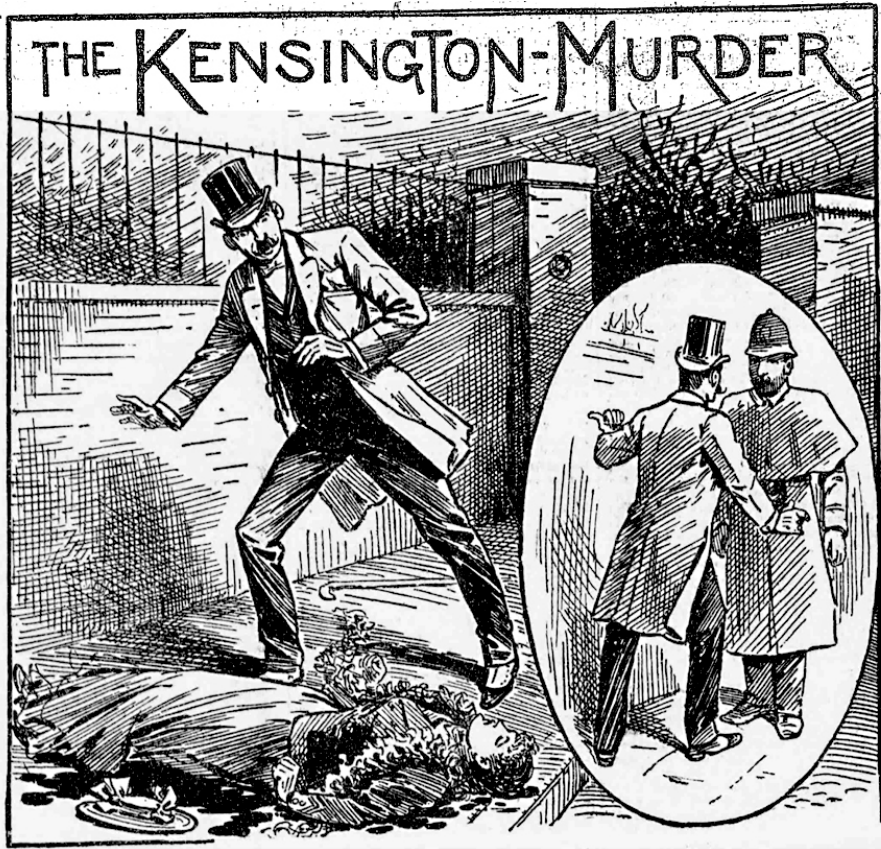

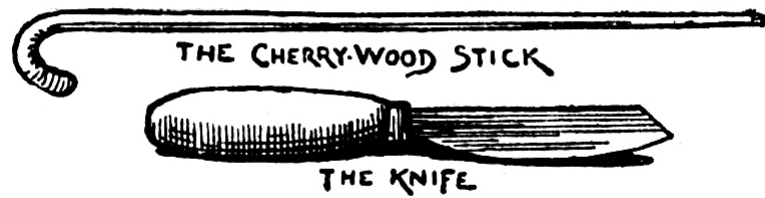

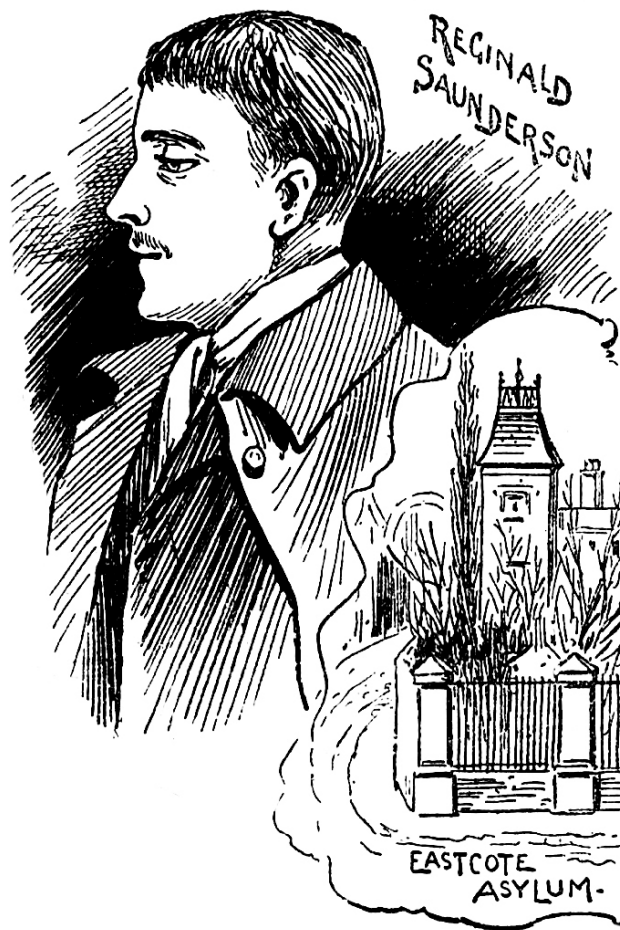
